African Leon Mba, 65, Charity Leader Was President of Gabon, Mrs. Fine, 62, Rites Today



LEON MBA

PARIS — President Leon Mba of the Gabon Republic died at the Embassy Tuesday a few minutes after being taken ill on his way there from his residence, embassy officials reported.

Mr. Mba, 65, was elected to the presidency of the former French colony country in West Africa in 1960, the year of its independence. He had been treated since August, 1966, at the Claude-Bernard Hospital here under Prof. Pierre Monnereau, a specialist in infectious diseases.

The hospital would give no details about Mr. Mba's ailment or the treatment he received.

Under a constitutional amendment, Vice President Albert Bongo, 31, a former French army corporal, succeeds to the presidency. He has been acting as president in Mr. Mba's absence.

Gabon is a nation of only 100,000 square miles with fewer than 500,000 people but it is rich in iron and uranium, has the largest manganese deposits outside the Soviet Union, and has a rapidly developing oil industry expected to produce 3.6 million tons of crude this year.

Mr. Mba was born in Libreville and was educated by Roman Catholic missionaries. He was elected to the French chamber but actively resisted colonialism and served prison terms for his actions. In 1946 he founded the first political committee and later became a leader in the Rassemblement Democratique political party, keystone to his country.

Walter Gross, Songwriter And Pianist, 58
LOS ANGELES — Composer-pianist Walter Gross, who wrote the song "Tenderly," is dead at the age of 58.

Mr. Gross, born in New York City, was found unconscious in his Los Angeles apartment Monday. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Burbank, where he died about an hour later. A child prodigy, he played his first piano recital at age 10. Later he wrote many songs, including "Your Love," "Be Worried of You," "Just a Moon Ago," "I'm In A Fog About You," "Creepy Weep," and "How I Remember You," and Mexican Moon."

White House Chef Buried In France
GRENOBLE, France — Funeral services were held at nearby Voiron Tuesday for Ferdinand Louvat, pastry chef at the White House. Mr. Louvat, 58, died last week at the Bethesda Medical Hospital where he was treated for cancer. His body was flown to Grenoble in a U.S. Military Air Service plane.

A wreath sent from President and Mrs. Johnson and from the White House staff was placed on his grave. The U.S. consul and vice-consul in Lyon attended the funeral service.

Henry G. Norman Was Financial Executive
MONTREAL — Henry G. Norman, 77, former president of the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges, died Monday in Wakehurst General Hospital after a short illness.

Born in London, England, Mr. Norman came to Canada in 1910. After fighting as a machine gunner in World War I, he moved to Philadelphia where he worked as an accountant for Price Waterhouse and Co. In 1931 he returned to Canada where he became a senior and international partner with the firm.

In World War II, Mr. Norman served as financial advisor to the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. Upon retirement from Price Waterhouse in 1952, he became Canadian ambassador to Venezuela and in 1955 Canadian consul-general in New York.

In the latter part of 1956 he became the first full-time president of the exchanges, a post he held until 1959. He leaves one daughter and two sons.

Viet Victim Buried Again After 'Mistake'
LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Pfc. Quinn Q. Tichenor once buried in the wrong grave, got a full military funeral Tuesday under his correct name.

His family saw the 23-year-old soldier privately for the last time in the Baptist Tabernacle. Pfc. Tichenor had taught Sunday School there, met his wife there, and was married there.

Pfc. Tichenor's wedding ring was pinned to the silk lining of his casket. About 25 Masons, some of them veterans of other wars, took part in the service.

Tichenor was killed in combat in Vietnam earlier in the month and then erroneously identified as Pfc. John Quinn of Elizabethtown, Tenn. His body was shipped there. He was buried by Quinn's family.

After the mistake was discovered, the body was brought home from Vietnam and Pfc. Tichenor's body sent here Sunday.

100 Cong Die Rushing Allied Camp

SAIGON — Communist troops overran the American and South Vietnamese military headquarters in the town of Bu Dop 60 miles north of Saigon before daybreak today in a heavy attack, the United States command reported. Reports from the front at midmorning said American air raids on the complex and counterattacks by U.S. reinforcements killed at least 100 Viet Cong.

Pierce fighting was under way more than 10 hours after the force of some 400 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong struck, and control of the town was in doubt. The communists were reported attacking a U.S. Army Special Forces camp near the town.

Battle-seasoned veterans of the Army's 1st Infantry Division were rushed to the front in the allied drive to crush the assault.

Reaching Saigon from Bu Dop this morning said the communists overran the district headquarters of the Army's 1st Infantry Division.
