A Few Words on Behavioral Interviewing

A writer sits down at her computer to tell a story. When she decides that a character takes out some change, counts it, and stuffs it back in his pocket, she's writing that for a reason. Maybe later on they have to loan someone money, or buy a gift. Either way, at some point in the story, that money will be used for something. Think about this when you talk about situations, times when you've had to lead groups or solve a problem. Often times we get caught up in the habit of rambling, getting off topic, ultimately sharing information that's not pertinent to the story you're telling.

It's more than just saying "I am a good leader" or "I'm a people person." It's about the examples you share that reflect your leadership skills and ability to work with all types of people, personality quirks, different backgrounds, the "difficult" people and everything else in between. It's what I like to call giving an employer a "snap shot." I also encourage you to think about the beginning, middle and end. Where is this happening and what's the situation? What did you do to handle the situation and finally, what was the outcome?

On October 13th, General Electric was on campus hosting a presentation on behavioral interviewing. As more and more companies adopt this style of interviewing it becomes increasingly more important to prepare yourself for the interviewing process. Students were told to be aware of the "drill down". Although it is not something to be nervous about, GE representatives encouraged students to be aware that the next question was coming directly following their response. By nature, behavioral interviewing can sound harsh but the purpose is to get the applicant to explain how their experiences make them a great fit for the company.
