Dear Student,

ONLINE HOUSING APPLICATION – The Office of Residential Life has developed a web-based housing application, available through the Agora Portal, Boston College's computing system. Once new students register for courses, you will receive via e-mail your BC username and password which you will use to access the Agora Portal. Once in the Agora Portal, select the option for summer housing and complete and submit the form online.

The Office of Residential Life Web site (www.bc.edu/summerhousing) includes information to assist with your transition to Boston College, the floor plans for Vouté and Gabelli residence halls where the Summer Institute students will be living, and much more. Summer Housing rates and application dates and deadlines for 2011 will be available at this site in the coming weeks as well.

Please note that sheets, towels, pillows, and pillowcases are provided. Blankets and lamps are not provided. Boston College dining halls are open for the six-week summer session. Each apartment has a kitchen, if you would like to cook. However, pots, pans, dishes, silverware, can openers, microwaves, and other kitchen implements are not provided. If you wish to cook your own meals during your stay on campus, you will need to bring these items for your apartment. You may also want to bring a luggage cart to assist with move in and to transport groceries if you will not have a car. For more housing information, see pages 12-13 of this booklet.

REGISTRATION DEADLINES

REGISTRATION POLICY: All students must be registered for class before the class begins.

Registrations should be received by the Friday prior to the start of each summer session. If your course registration is received by mail after the following dates: June 10th (for Session I), June 24th (for Session II), and July 8th (for Session III), your confirmation of registration will not be mailed out. International student registrations received after June 1st will be processed, but confirmations will not be mailed out.

All name tags will be distributed in class on the first day.

REGISTRATION AND NAME TAG INFORMATION

NAME TAGS: All students must wear their name tags for admittance to class. Name tags will be delivered to you in class on the first day.

Students who add a course will be given a new name tag at the time they turn in their old one.

ONLINE DROP/ADD: Students who drop/add online will need to request a new name tag from the STM prior to the second meeting of the class.

REFUNDS: Students who withdraw from a course before the first class meeting will receive a 100% refund.

PLEASE NOTE: Refunds are not available after the second class meeting.

COURSE INFORMATION

The Post-Master's Certificate Program in Spiritual Formation is a summer program designed for persons experienced in ministry with an earned master's level degree or the equivalent in a theological discipline. The purpose of the program is to enable pastoral leaders to become spiritual mentors for persons and for Christian communities of faith. The program of studies will consist of three consecutive summer residencies of two weeks each involving both morning and afternoon sessions.

The goal is to establish a model for a meaningful Christian way of life for laity in the 21st century. Sessions build on each other, so it is recommended that participants come to both sessions (though one session is permitted). *Suzanne and Brayton Shanley are the co-founders of Agape Community, a lay Catholic residential community, ecumenical and interfaith in outreach and practice, with a focus on daily prayer, evangelical simplicity, and nonviolent witness in the world.*

This two-week afternoon workshop will explore the use of gesture, ritual movement, and dance in diverse forms, and their place in Catholic liturgy. This experience will complement the STM Summer Institute’s Session Three evening classes on liturgy and music. Participants will learn principles of movement composition and how they can be integrated into the liturgical prayer of the community. No formal dance training is necessary. The workshop will meet from 2:30-4:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday (July 25-28) and Monday through Wednesday (August 1-3), with participation in the STM liturgies on July 29th and August 4th. *Rev. Robert VerEecke, S.J. is Jesuit Artist in Residence, Boston College, and his colleagues, Jamie and Nicole Huggins, have offered the Summer Institute program in Sacred and Liturgical Dance for more than ten years.*

Summer Sabbatical Program

Deepen your spirituality, renew your ministry

PROGRAM FEATURES

- An opportunity to **balance** learning with spiritual growth, relaxation, intentional reflection, and community life with other experienced ministers.
- **Flexibility.** Students may attend for a minimum of 2 weeks and may stay on-campus for up to 6 weeks, enrolled in the Sabbatical Colloquium and other courses.
- The **Sabbatical Colloquium**, meeting twice weekly and offering sabbatical students a spiritually formative discussion in a collegial atmosphere. It is a six-week experience, available with an online component for those unable to be on campus for the whole six weeks. Drawing on the rich backgrounds of the participants, the Colloquium will invite meaningful reflection and candid sharing on spiritual practice, spiritual development issues, and on what it means to be ministers in today's Church.
- The opportunity to audit one- and two-week **courses** taught by the Summer Institute's world class faculty (in addition to the Colloquium). Due to the intensity of these academic courses over the short summer period, for an optimal sabbatical experience STM recommends not more than a total of four weeks of course work for sabbatical students, and not more than one course per session.
- Options for **deepening spirituality** with spiritual direction (from local experienced guides) and prayer opportunities. Some spiritual directors charge a modest stipend, which will be at personal expense.
- **Economical housing** in on-campus apartments. Options are available for single rooms in shared apartments, or for shared rooms in shared apartments. Sabbatical students will be grouped together on a floor or wing as feasible. Students may cook or purchase meals in campus dining facilities. A limited number of apartments are available for families.
- Casual weekly **lunch with a faculty member** on-campus. (Individual food at personal expense.)
- **Free time** for rest, prayer, or the opportunity to partake of the many optional events and activities offered during the Summer Institute. These include no-cost events such as Faculty Conversations, Closing BBQ, ice cream social, lectures, and workshops, as well as student life events that charge a small fee (Red Sox games, Harbor Cruise, sightseeing programs, etc.).

Costs and fees will be determined according to the 2011 summer tuition and housing fee schedule. Sabbatical students audit their courses, paying half the tuition rate. The Colloquium is billed at the rate of one audit unit (\$330). Please note that housing, meals, spiritual direction, and certain optional events are additional personal expenses.

SUMMER CONTEXTUAL EDUCATION

For Summer-Only Degree Students

Contextual Education is required of all M.A. in Pastoral Ministry and M.Ed. students. The purpose of Contextual Education is to provide students with the opportunity to bring theology and context together in an intentional way. The disciplines of theological reflection, when brought to bear on a student's current experience in ministry, can provide powerful insights and lead to new growth, depth, and change. We believe that no matter how long a person has served in their context of ministry – whether the parish, the school, the campus, the retreat center, or the hospital – that context is a rich source of theology and a perfect arena for the integration of faith and practice. Contextual Education embodies the STM's commitment to theological reflection. A solid Contextual Education experience includes opportunities to share, process, and reflect with peers and with the STM staff.

Students should register for Contextual Education when they are halfway through their master's program. Typically, summer-only degree students complete their Contextual Education placement requirement on their own during the academic year. The time commitment at the placement is five hours a week for 28 weeks. This includes a one hour meeting with their supervisor each week. The location and nature of the placement is determined between the student and Theresa O'Keefe, Faculty Co-Director for Contextual Education, who can be reached at (617) 552-0932 or theresa.okeefe@bc.edu.

Furthermore, the STM requires that all students in M.A. in Pastoral Ministry and M.Ed. programs be part of a practicum group for this purpose of group reflection. In the summer before beginning their placements, students meet in a Practicum Group (Practicum Group I) for initial introduction, exploration, and reflection. During the year, students interact regularly online. Finally, during the summer following their placement experience, students meet again in their Practicum Group (Practicum Group II) to debrief and reflect on their experience.

This summer, Practicum Group I (the 2011 – 2012 class) will meet on July 19, 20, and 21 from 2:00 – 4:30 p.m. All Practicum Group meetings will take place in 9 Lake St., Rm. 332 under the leadership of Theresa O'Keefe, Faculty Co-Director for Contextual Education.

It is suggested that students be familiar with *Shared Wisdom: A Guide to Case Study Reflection in Ministry* by Mahan, Troxell, and Allen (1983) in anticipation of Practicum Group I meetings.

Students receive two academic credits for this program.

ONLINE HOUSING APPLICATIONS

You will need your Boston College username and password to apply through Boston College's online computing system, the Agora Portal. New students will receive an e-mail with your username and password once you register for your summer course(s).

The online application will be available in mid-late April 2011 and will close in early June. No paper applications are available. If you have any questions regarding summer housing, please e-mail stmsummer@bc.edu or call the STM at (617) 552-6501.

RESIDENCE HALLS

Gabelli and Voute Halls will be used to house Summer Institute students for Sessions I, II, and III. Due to space restrictions, housing assignments will be granted based on the date your application is received. Please make sure you have applied by the June 2011 deadline. We cannot guarantee housing for applications received after the June 2011 deadline.

All units in Voute and Gabelli Halls are air-conditioned. All units have two bedrooms and include a kitchen, bathroom, common room, and ample storage space. **The kitchens include a refrigerator, stove, dishwasher, and sink. Dishes, pots, pans, glasses, silverware and other utensils are NOT provided. If you wish to cook in the apartments, you will need to supply these items.**

Single Accommodation includes a single bedroom in a shared apartment.

Double Accommodation includes a shared bedroom in a shared apartment.

Each bedroom is furnished with two single beds, two desks, to study chairs, and two dressers.

All buildings at Boston College, including the residence halls, are smoke free.

Each apartment is wired with four phone lines, four Agora campus network jacks and five cable TV outlets. Boston College does not supply telephones, answering machines, or televisions, but we encourage Summer Institute students to bring their own. We will be able to tell you your specific phone number upon your arrival to campus (simply ask at check-in). The summer phone system does not include long distance service, but will allow 800 numbers. We encourage students to buy prepaid calling cards for long distance service.

If you have a specific person with whom you would like to share your room or apartment, please indicate that on the application form. You may only request a person who is taking the same sessions as you are. Summer Housing is unable to "hold" a space for two weeks until a friend arrives. Conversely, should your roommate/apartmentmate leave earlier than you, Summer Housing will need to fill the bed space with a new student.

Unfortunately, Summer Housing is not able to house Summer Institute students before or after the session. Please plan your travel accordingly. **If you must arrive to the city before your session, you may apply to stay in the Summer Guest House. To register for Summer Guest House, visit www.bc.edu/guesthouse.** Due to the limited time available to prepare the halls, no one will be allowed to move into their assignment until the official move-in day.

RATES (Prices reflect 2010 Housing Costs – 2011 Housing Costs will be available in mid-April online.)

Single Accommodation (one person per bedroom in shared apartment): \$204/week or \$1,224/six weeks

Double Accommodation (two people per bedroom in shared apartment): \$128.50/week or \$771/six weeks

Family occupancy (entire two bedroom apartment): \$385.50/week or \$2,313/six weeks*

*Please note: Family occupancy apartments are extremely limited and will be distributed in accordance to need by STM. Family occupancy is designed for Summer Institute students with children. Please contact the Summer Housing office directly at summer.housing@bc.edu if you are considering bringing your family.

Summer Institute students bringing a spouse should register twice, each for a double accommodation and indicate you are bringing a spouse in the comment section of the application. A separate application must be created for each individual when bringing a spouse.

CHECK-IN

Summer Institute students may check-in at Voute Hall on Sunday, June 26 and Sunday, July 10 between 10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. If you are checking in after 7:00 p.m. on these days, or on any other day including Sunday, July 24 for third session, you may check in at the Welcome Center, located at 110 St. Thomas More Drive Residence Hall, across from St. Ignatius Church.

Vouté and Gabelli Halls are located within a five minute walking distance from the Welcome Center.

The Welcome Center is open from 9:00 – 1:00 a.m. daily. Please do not arrive outside these hours, as there will be no staff available to check you in. If you have an international flight that arrives after 1:00 a.m. please e-mail summer.housing@bc.edu to make specific arrangements. After May 20, you may also call the Welcome Center directly at (617) 655-5555. Although the Welcome Center is open until 1:00 a.m., please call between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. if you have questions.

CHECK-OUT

Housing check-out time is Saturday at 12:00 p.m. Exception: Week I, Session II attendees must check out by 12:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 17, 2011. Check-out materials will be available in the building lobby. Those wishing to check out early must do so at the Welcome Center located in the 110 St. Thomas More Hall. Keys must be returned upon check-out. Keys not returned will result in a charge assessed to the student's account.

MAIL

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT VISAS

TO: Prospective International Summer Session Students

DATE: Summer Session 2011

As you may know, the United States Government requires citizens of another country to have a visa in order to enter the United States. As you are a prospective student for the Boston College Summer Session, I would like to inform you of the latest INS regulations.

Students enrolled in a Boston College **degree** program for summer study, and registered for classes in all three sessions for credit are considered full-time. These students are required to obtain an I-20 from Boston College and enter the United States on a Student Visa. Students are not eligible for an I-20 if enrolled in a part-time program. Although visitors in B-1/B-2 status are not allowed to be enrolled in a "course of study," casual, short-term, part-time coursework such as taking a single class is generally not considered to be a "course of study" and therefore may be permitted in the B category.

Medical Insurance to cover you during your stay can be purchased with your airline ticket through your travel agent. Of the three standard options, varying types of coverage are available. You are strongly advised to take advantage of these options when traveling abroad.

HOW TO GET FROM LOGAN AIRPORT TO BC

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION: Massport Shuttle busses pick up passengers in front of the airline terminals and bring them to the Airport subway station (known as the "T"). Take the **Blue Line** subway inbound to **Government Center**. At Government Center change (go upstairs) to the **Boston College Green Line** outbound train, **Line B** to Boston College. Stay on the train to the end of the line. (Refer to Map of Chestnut Hill Campus for the Subway stop.)

CAR: From Logan International Airport, Boston, MA, follow the signs for Airport Exit and enter the on-ramp to I-90 West (also known as the Mass Pike or Massachusetts Turnpike.) Follow signs for the Ted Williams Tunnel. Continue on I-90 W through the Ted Williams Tunnel. In approximately six miles, bear right onto off-ramp at exit 20 to Cambridge St. Take Cambridge St. ramp toward Allston/Brighton. Continue on Cambridge St. for approximately two miles. Cambridge St. becomes Washington St. At lights, turn left onto Chestnut Hill Ave. Bear right onto South St. At the end of South St., bear right onto Commonwealth Ave. (Route 30 West.)

At the set of lights, Boston College will be to your left. To reach 110 St. Thomas More Drive, turn left at the lights and then turn right into campus. 110 St. Thomas More Drive will be the first residence hall on the left before you enter the gate to campus. To reach Vouté and Gabelli Halls, do not turn at lights but continue straight through the lights up the hill. Vouté Hall will be on the left-hand side, the last building before the Main Entrance to campus. Gabelli Hall is next to Vouté Hall.

TAXI: There are many taxi companies in the Chestnut Hill and Boston areas. They are generally reliable but they are expensive, about \$50 including tip and tolls. It is usually best to circle where on campus you will be going and to give the map to the cab driver. Following are some of the major companies in the area (see the Yellow Pages for complete listings): Boston Cab (Brighton Cab) (617) 536-2600 or (617) 536-5010; Newton Yellow Cab (617) 332-7700. Gray Van Express offers shuttle service between the airport and Boston College for approximately \$27.00 each way. Call (888) 222-5229 at least 24 hours in advance of your arrival/departure to make a reservation.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS AND INFORMATION

MORNING CLASSES

The majority of Summer Session 2011 classes will meet in the morning. TM730 (Holistic Formation for Ministry), TM530 (Contextual Education), and TM871 (Colloquium on Ministry and Life) will meet in the afternoon. TM851 (Post-Master's Certificate in Spiritual Formation) will meet in the morning and in the afternoon. TM631 and TM632 (Contemporary Spirituality) in Session Two, and TM667 and TM668 in Session Three, will meet in the evening.

STM OFFICES

The STM Offices are located on the Brighton Campus at 9 Lake Street. STM administrators and staff will be available at the mid-morning break for questions, add/drop information, and consultation and they can also be contacted by e-mail and phone and in their offices.

TM530 CONTEXTUAL EDUCATION

Summer Students planning to fulfill their Contextual Education requirement by working in a field placement during the academic year are required to attend the Contextual Education Practicum Group meetings. See page 11 for information and details.

TM730 HOLISTIC FORMATION

Summer-only master's degree students are required to register for Holistic Formation for the Practice of Ministry. In this one-credit formation process, students gather in small faith sharing groups for prayer and reflection on central themes of spirituality for ministry in order to cultivate practices for integrating faith, life, and ministry. The process consists of two parts: the weekly faith sharing groups and the creation of a personal spiritual formation plan, the components of which may be fulfilled throughout the duration of one's degree program. Groups meet once per week on Mondays from 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. (except for the week of July 4 when the group will meet on Tuesday, July 5) under the guidance of a trained facilitator. The required Holistic Formation Workbook is available at the BC Bookstore. Graded on pass/fail basis.

NOTE: Master's degree students who live locally and/or who also take courses in the academic year are required to take TM730 in the academic year rather than the summer. Students with questions about this policy should contact Sr. Barbara Quinn, R.S.C.J., Associate Director of Spiritual Formation at (617) 552-8447.

MASTERS SYNTHESIS PROJECT

Students planning to complete their Synthesis Project this summer must register for TM888 and have first drafts of their papers by June 20, 2011. SUMMER FACULTY CONVERSATIONS

SUMMER WEEKLY REPAST

This summer STM will host a weekly repast at 9 Lake St. on Wednesday afternoons following liturgy and prior to Faculty Conversations, offering a simple lunch around which the community can gather.

DAILY WORSHIP

Daily worship is celebrated at 12:00 p.m. Monday through Friday in the STM chapel throughout the Summer Session, although the June 27 Opening Mass and the August 4 Closing and Sending forth Mass will be held in the Lannon Chapel of St. Ignatius Church at 12:00 p.m. in order to accommodate the large liturgical assembly. Eucharist is celebrated on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays; Midday Prayer from the Liturgy

of the Hours is sung on Tuesdays; special rituals are celebrated on Thursdays. Students are invited to participate in liturgical ministries, including lector, ministers of Holy Communion, Eucharistic Bread bakers, acolytes, and music ministers. STUDENT IDS

All Boston College students must obtain an "EagleOne" picture ID card. The ID card allows students to access their student records, charge meals at campus dining facilities and gain access to on-campus library and recreational facilities. To obtain an "EagleOne" card, students should go to the Student Services Office, Lyons Hall. A \$30 ID charge will be billed to your student account. STUDENT SERVICES

PARKING

Boston College has a pay parking system. All people using parking at Boston College are required to pay. There is an hourly parking option and Summer Institute students also have the option of purchasing weekly parking permits for Summer 2011. More Summer Institute parking information and the application for weekly permits can be obtained at Summer Parking (www.bc.edu/offices/transportation) in April 2011. Students checking into Summer Institute Housing on the day prior to the start of each session will be given a pass to park until the next afternoon. Students driving to campus for class on the first day of each session will also be given a day pass for that day only. In order to continue to park on campus, you must purchase your permit at Student Services by the end of that day or pay to park on a daily basis.

GATHERING PLACE

There will be an opportunity for community socialization at the Gathering Place, Vouté Hall Room 304, most Sunday – Thursday evenings from 8:30 – 10:30 p.m. during each of the three summer sessions.

STUDENT GUIDES

Available in June, the Student Guide will contain useful information regarding the summer program including class location changes, a calendar of events, guidelines, and various other information.

CABLE TELEVISION SERVICE

If you would like cable television in your apartment, you will need to bring a cable ready television. Cable service is provided at no additional charge and provides a unique Boston College channel lineup. Televisions are provided in the public lounge of each building.

TELEPHONE SERVICE/PHONE CARDS

Public telephones are available in the lobby of each residence hall except Vouté. Boston College also provides telephone service and free local dialing access in each on-campus apartment. You will need to bring a residential touch tone telephone in order to utilize this service. **Voice-mail will not be available to summer students. You will need to bring an answering machine, if you require this service.** Local calling is free of charge but you will need to bring a calling card in order to make long-distance calls. Some

regular credit cards do allow charging for phone calls. Please contact your credit card company for information on phone call charging availability.

Calling outside of the U.S.: Students from Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland, and England: dial 011-44-area code (drop 0) and the phone number. To call Ireland dial 011-353-area code (drop 0) and the phone number. If you are from Australia, New Zealand, or Ireland, you should purchase a Telcom phone card that permits long-distance calling. Pre-paid U.S. phone cards may be purchased at stores such as Campus Convenience, 2195 Commonwealth Avenue, Chestnut Hill, MA 02467.

LAMPS

You will need to bring a desk lamp with you if you need one; they are not provided in the residence halls.

CHILD CARE

Preschool Summer Camp is available at the Boston College Children's Center located in the Haley Carriage House, 47 Stone Ave., Chestnut Hill, MA. The camp runs from Monday, June 27 to Friday, August 26, 2011. Children must be over three years and nine months up to five years of age and be fully toilet-trained to be eligible to participate. Hours are 8:00 a.m. – 5:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. on Fridays. Enrollment is for five full days/week at \$342 per week or five half days ending at 1:00 p.m. for \$230 per week. Camp includes swimming at the BC pool, special activities, events, and performances.
