III. Co-curricular Activities

Activity 1: Member, La Maison Française

September 1998 – May 2002

- Description: Worked with group to promote French culture on campus. Sponsored movies, dinners and discussions, all designed to connect the Boston College community with French culture. Participated in the French Theatre Club, where French texts were read and discussed at length.
- Skills: Organization, practicing and maintaining fluency in the French language.
- Time Commitment: 2 hours a week.

Activity 2: Executive Committee, Model United Nations

September 1998 – May 2002

- Description: Attended intense committee sessions designed to orient participants to the United Nations, and partake in a program which accurately simulates United Nations committee sessions. Researched specific country's views on economic, social and political topics. Argued on behalf of country's interest in mock debates.
- Skills: Research, inter-personal communication, debating, public speaking, cross-cultural dialogue.
- Time Commitment: 1-2 hours a week plus 16 intensive 4-day conferences.

Activity 3: Sales Intern, EF Au Pair

March 2001 – May 2002

- Description: Work within a Swedish company, promoting cultural awareness in their Culture Care Au Pair Program. Review applications for Au Pairs from American host families, placing Au Pairs from overseas into their homes. Communicate with the international Au Pairs to help them problem solve situations with families.
- Skills: Language, intercultural communication, sales, listening, problem-solving.
- Time Commitment: 5-10 hours a week during the semester, 40+ during the summer.

Service Project: Appalachia Volunteers

January 2000 – March 2000

- Description: Worked within an African-American community in Farrel-Sherard, Mississippi to help with the construction and rehabilitation of homes. Met with members of the community to learn about life in the deep south and the economic structures.
- Skills: Basic carpentry, empathy, cultural understanding, and communication.
- Time Commitment: 1 hour a week and 1 week during Spring Break.
