III. Co-curricular Activities

Activity 1: International Assistant & Coordinator, Boston College

March, 2004 – May, 2007

- Description: Mentor incoming international students to Boston College on how to effectively communicate in a cross cultural environment. Interview future members for the organization to ensure that only the most capable applicants are selected. Organized several group events in the New England Area for international students.
- Skills: Deepened appreciation for the inclusion of all cultures. Demonstrated strong supervisory and organizational skills. Strong interviewing skills developed. Utilized cross-cultural communication.
- Time Commitment: 1-2 hours per week; 7 day training and orientation

Activity 2: Habitat for Humanity, La Libertad, El Salvador

September, 2004 – April, 2005

- Description: Learned about the social, political and economic issues of El Salvador during the course of the semester. Visited indigenous communities in La Libertad, El Salvador, to understand the problems faced by the people. Constructed houses for local families.
- Skills: Leadership, planning, organizing events and/or activities, working with people, understanding and adapting to different unpredicted situations. Translating between English and Spanish and becoming more culturally competent.
- Time Commitment: 1-2 hours per week; 10 day trip

Activity 3: Clinica La Inmaculada, Bogotá, Colombia

July, 2006 – August, 2006

- Description: Organized and executed activities for patients with mental disorders ranging between the age of 15 and 80. Assisted with direct cognitive stimulation and other patient treatments with a trained psychologist. Offered insight at group staff meetings.
- Skills: Leadership, planning, organizing events and/or activities, working with people, and adapting to different unpredicted situations.
- Time Commitment: 10 hours per week

Service Project: Native American Reservation Service Trip, New Mexico

September, 2005 – June, 2006

- Description: Organized several fundraising events and single-handedly raised over \$900 for the trip. Researched and presented the cultural, religious and historical aspects of Native Americans to 21 team members. Lived on the Native American Reservation for nine days, working to understand their lives and challenges. Informed high school students about ways they can further their education, helped dig out the communities ditches used for irrigation and clean out the Public Works warehouse.
- Skills: Developed leadership, planning, organizing events and/or activities, working with people.
- Time Commitment: 1-2 hours per week; 9 day trip
