
<u>Oh Myo Kim</u>

Oh Myo Kim, M.Div, Ph.D., is an associate professor of the practice in the Counseling Developmental, and Educational Psychology department. Her research focuses on adoption, the family dynamics in transracial families, and identity development in adopted adults, but her research extends to cultural socialization, racial and ethnic identity, and social oppression. More recently, Dr. Kim's research is focusing on pregnancy and motherhood for adopted individuals.



Min Hyoung Song is the Chair of the English Department, Professor of English, and Director of the Asian American Studies Program at Boston College




Climate Lyricism






