- Introduction to Business Law: Introduction to Law: undergraduate, required course that is a broad overview of our legal system, covering fundamental legal issues such as contracts, employment law and intellectual property.
- Portico: undergraduate course in business ethics required for first year Carroll School students; the course allows students a unique opportunity to situate contemporary business in a context that is global and historical; learn about business through engagement with faculty and practitioners; develop a nuanced method for recognizing and responding to the ethical opportunities and challenges of contemporary business;

Courses:

Undergraduate:

- Introduction to Law: undergraduate, required course that is a broad overview of our legal system, covering fundamental legal issues such as contracts, employment law and intellectual property.
- Business, Justice and Responsibility: undergraduate elective that explores the legal and ethical challenges a leader will face in a highly regulated, complex, global business. The course explores societal issues such as lying, bias, fraud, corruption, stereotyping, religious freedom, discrimination, and whistleblowing, and considers the responsibility of a business and its leaders to address these challenges, and to create a more just society. Students also consider the competing roles of business, the legislature, and the courts in addressing societal issues.
- Securities Regulation: undergraduate elective that focuses upon the key federal statutes that regulate securities and participants in the securities markets: the Securities Act of 1933, the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, Sarbanes-Oxley, the Dodd-Frank Act of 2010, the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, and several criminal statutes that are utilized for violations of securities law and regulations. Students read statutes and case law, and use examples and guest speakers to understand the application of the law in real life. The class is intended for students interested in careers in finance or leadership in a public company. The goal is not to create securities lawyers, but to give students an awareness of the regulation and the legal risks involved in the securities market.
- Honors Program Sophomore Colloquia on Failure: Honors Program seminar for sophomore class focusing on Failure. The course asks students to study social sciences research on how to overcome failure, grit, embracing failure to lead to creativity, and the like. Students engaged in semester long Failure Project intended to challenge them to take risks, work to overcome obstacles, and reflect on what they learned from the struggle.
- Honors Program International Field Seminar: Semester-long study of Estonia and Finland's history, politics, business environment, and culture, culminating in a week in those countries meeting with representatives of international and local companies, non-profit entities, and governmental programs, learning about different business sectors, sampling their culture, and exploring Tallinn and Helsinki. Class also teaches students skills regarding preparing for company visits, and cross-cultural communication.

- Religious Freedom versus Discrimination: (2016, 2017) Honors Program seminar that examines the conflict between religious freedom and discrimination. The course asks students to consider how to balance these important values, both within an organization and in how the organization behaves as a member of society. Students study the law surrounding this conflict, from Supreme Court decisions to state statutes, and consider corporate policies and responses to the debate.

Executive MBA:

- Law and Ethics Residence Week: (2016 – 2019) Leading the Good Life, Law and Ethics one-week intensive course (co-taught). Teach the ethics half of the course, covering topics such as blind spots, ethical frameworks, Giving Voice to Values, corporate social responsibility, and bias with a class of executives.

- MSMS Faculty Member: (2015-16, 2016-17) Designed and taught drop-in intensive ethics curriculum for one-year Master of Science in Management Studies program

MBA:

- Introduction to Business Law: (2007- 2011) taught graduate course that introduces fundamental areas of the law for business people, such as contracts, employment law, and torts.
- Ethics, Values and Responsibility: (2013-2015) co-developer of Ethics intensive course for MBA students as part of school-wide curriculum revision. Ethics, Values and Responsibility is a three-day intensive course that is designed to lay a conceptual foundation, introduce frameworks and a common language for ethical decision-making, and provoke awareness of one's values to help guide principled thought and analysis. It covers topics such as pitfalls, key frameworks, lying, child labor, corporate social responsibility, and organizational ethics.
- Ethical Leadership in a Global Economy: (2014; 2017) developer of required course for MBA students about being an ethical leader in the global context. Using a "Learn, Create, Teach" framework, the course is designed for students to learn what questions an ethical leader has to ask in a global context. Then student teams create a case about an ethical challenge for a leader in a global context, and its solution, in the Giving Voice to Values style. Finally, the teams teach the case to the class.
